Dear Board of Directors:

Thank you for partnering with us on the 6th Desert-Wise Landscape Tour. Your support made it possible for us to reach this year's goals: expand the Tour and its influence. We have been asked for several years to host the Tour over 2 days. This request posed a challenge of manpower and resources but with your support and being able recruit 45 volunteers, we made it happen. Our audience was very pleased with the expansion so we will be continuing with the 2-day Tour.

Additionally, there were other successful firsts. Broader and more frequent media interest, a larger footprint on social media, more outreach tables to accommodate the larger crowds, more essay submissions to the "after-Tour" contest, and more support from our local water agencies have pushed our attendance over the 300 mark goal. Our tour continues to reach more ratepayers.

In our aim for the program to change habits of how we use water and energy, the "after-Tour" essays reveal lessons learned:

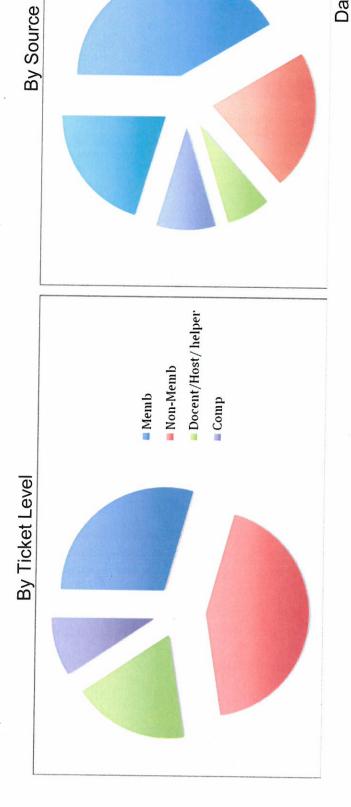

2016 Landscape Tour Essays

1st Place Essay 2016 by C. Reed

Morning light warmed our backs as we coasted into Morongo Valley. A recent high desert arrival, I eagerly anticipated learning to work with the water-wise plants that thrive here, and I was certainly not disappointed. I discovered a rich variety of beautiful, practical environments, all designed to fit within our local ecosystem.

Some homes were lushly landscaped in a traditional aesthetic, while others took inventive approaches to outdoor art, employing the natural world as a medium of expression. There were homes with outdoor showers, properties with greenhouses, and entire outdoor rooms situated amid blooming native plants. We perused both simple and elaborate systems of solar power generation as well as some truly ingenious water conservation techniques. And best of all were the wonderful conversations we had with hosts and docents and with our fellow tour-takers.

In the afternoon we explored the windblown mesa, clambering among giant boulders to discover secret viewpoints that just happened to have perfect seating arrangements in wind-screened scenic spots. Well, maybe not so secret after all...!

Throughout the gorgeous Basin we roamed, soaking up inspiration. And there was one unexpected revelation – ironic, because of what drew me to this area in the first place – the rocks. From gigantic boulders to the finest grains of sand, and every size in between, landscapers work with the mineral kingdom in ways both useful and exquisitely lovely. Rocks facilitate drainage! They're for sitting on! Rocks are art elements! Rocks are for weed control! They're walls; they're walkways; they're habitat enhancements! It turns out that rocks really do rock!

As evening light spread shadow and gold across the desert floor, we headed home, grateful to these landscape artists for the generosity with which they shared their homes, their knowledge, and their journeys of discovery. Thank you MBCA for making it possible!

2nd Place Essay 2016 by Paul Kibbey

Desert Delights

I have been in Joshua Tree four years now and have not missed a Desert Wise Landscape Tour. Always surprised by visiting areas I have not explored, I delight in meeting the welcoming homeowners and docents who make the high desert their home.

What strikes me is seeing the unique ways people communicate with nature. I am thinking of one place where I sat with the owners on their deck surrounded by Palo Verdes profusely blossoming with yellow flowers, bathing us with magical yellow light. It was a perfect moment...a spiritual experience. What a harmonious interaction between plants and humans appreciating each other! (Or at least I felt as though the appreciation was mutual).

My next stop offered an entirely different experience, a tour of a property focused on permaculture. The guide presented the concept of observing the land over time to become familiar with its needs as a prerequisite to landscape planning.

Another idea suggested thinking ahead 100 years...the importance of being mindful of a future generation where everything works together for the greater good. An example shown us was that of a plant that gives off nitrogen placed next to a plant that requires nitrogen.

Finally, I came away from this site with a better idea of how rainwater can be harvested and guided to where it is needed. So, cutting water usage for landscaping is great, but using only natural rainfall? What a concept! And it is possible, eventually, with smart planning.

Well... I have been observing my property and noting it has a river running through it when the hard rains fall, and some natural swales which can be engineered to collect some of this water.

I think I feel a permaculture project coming on!

3rd Place Essay 2016 by Tami Ohl

My 5 acres is natural landscape except for my water intensive garden. My goal is to reduce my water usage using drought tolerant plants and water more effectively. After abandoning the grass, it left empty space. But which plants, placement and spacing? The desert wise landscape tour seemed promising for offering me solutions. The program told me I'd made a good choice and an exciting adventure, encompassing our own high desert, laid before me, enticing, me to find the first garden.

First on the list, Songbird Cottage, held true to the promise. It summoned you to sit in the swing to capture its beauty. Other gardens included large towering rocks and Vista's, claiming their own majesty with sweeping desert valley's below. Gardens intertwined naturally into the looming rocks and surrounding landscape, unfolding if by nature, not man. The plants in the gardens beckoned you to wind down the meandering paths. I got a nicker from an Appy horse welcoming me along with docents eager greetings. I found myself smiling and waving as the same cars passed by me, on the same adventure as I, and just as intrigued to see what lie next.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE TWENTYNINE PALMS WATER DISTRICT COMMENDING JIM THOMPSON FOR DISTINGUISHED PUBLIC SERVICE AS THE FIRE CHIEF OF THE TWENTYNINE PALMS FIRE DEPARTMENT

WHEREAS, Jim Thompson, while serving with the United States Marine Corps, began his career with the Twentynine Palms Fire Department on September 20, 1988 as a Paid-Call Firefighter, advancing to the position of Lieutenant and was selected as Firefighter of the Year in 1990; and

WHEREAS, upon being honorably discharged from the United States Marine Corps as a Gunnery Sergeant, began full-time employment with the Twentynine Palms Fire Department on March 9, 1993 serving in numerous positions at the Fire Department from Fire Inspector to Battalion Chief in charge of Operations and was appointed Fire Chief on October 15, 2003; and

WHEREAS, during Jim Thompson's service as Fire Chief, his leadership abilities have consistently enabled the Fire Department to serve the public safety needs of the residents of the District including but not limited to the following accomplishments:

Worked as an integral part of a team that resulted in the successful passage of Measure "J" enabling the 24-hour staffing of two fire stations for eight years;

Cooperatively worked with Copper Mountain College to improve and expand the curriculum for Fire Technology, including the creation of a Paid-Call Firefighter Academy, to provide better educational opportunities to local students;

Successfully acquired over \$300,000 in state and federal grant monies for firefighting equipment and fire station improvements resulting in improved firefighter safety and reducing short and long term budget demands; and

WHEREAS, Jim Thompson determinedly worked with District, City, County, and LAFCO officials to complete a successful annexation of the Twentynine Palms Fire Department to the San Bernardino County Fire Protection District, thereby creating a sustainable model of fire and emergency medical services for the community of Twentynine Palms.

GENERAL MANAGER EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN RAY KOLISZ AND THE TWENTYNINE PALMS WATER DISTRICT

THIS EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT (Agreement) is effective as of July 1, 2016 by and between the Twentynine Palms Water District, a public agency ("District") and Ray Kolisz an individual, ("Employee"), and who are collectively referred to herein as the "Parties."

RECITALS

This agreement is based upon the following facts and/or understandings:

WHEREAS, Employee has represented that he possesses the professional skills and qualifications necessary to adequately provide the services required of the General Manager position;

WHEREAS, the District desires to hire Employee as the General Manager and Employee desires to accept the position of General Manager of the District under the terms and conditions of this Agreement; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration for the promises set forth herein, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

SECTION 1 - EMPLOYMENT AND DUTIES

- 1.1 The Board of Directors of the District hereby agrees to employ Employee, and Employee hereby accepts employment as General Manager of the District subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.
- 1.2 District agrees to employ Employee in the position of General Manager to perform the functions and duties set forth in applicable ordinances, resolutions, and other Board policies pertaining to General Manager, as same may be amended from time to time, and any successor provisions thereto, and to perform other legally permissible and proper duties and functions consistent with the office of General Manager, as the Board of Directors shall from time to time assign.

SECTION 2 - COMMUNICATION WITH BOARD OF DIRECTORS

2.1 Subject to Brown Act requirements, and to the maximum extent reasonably possible, Employee shall provide his input to and communicate with all Directors simultaneously and shall take direction from the Board of Directors through proper action at duly recognized Board meetings. In any instance where such simultaneous communication with Directors is not feasible, Employee shall communicate with the President, Vice-President, or other Directors, in that order.

SECTION 3 - TERM

- 3.1 The term of this agreement with Employee shall be three years and shall be deemed to commence on July 1, 2016 and shall continue until June 30, 2019 unless sooner terminated by the Parties pursuant to this Agreement.
- 3.2 It is understood and agreed that Employee holds office at the pleasure of the Board of Directors. Since Employee is an "At Will" employee, the Board may terminate the services of Employee as General Manager at any time for no reason and for no cause. Nevertheless, the District's Board of Directors shall not exercise its right of termination during any one hundred twenty(120) day period following the seating of any new Board Member unless termination is for "cause" as defined in Section 9 of this Agreement.

SECTION 4 - RENEWAL TERMS

4.1 This Agreement shall be automatically extended for successive periods of two (2) years (Renewal Term), unless the Board gives written notice to Employee not less than three (3) months prior to the expiration of the Original Term as set forth in Section 3.1, or a Renewal Term. Such notice from the Board may include, but is not necessarily limited to, the Board's desire to allow the Original Term, or a Renewal Term, to expire, or to re-negotiate the terms and conditions of this Agreement. At least six (6) months prior to expiration of the Original Term, or a Renewal Term, Employee shall provide the Board with notice that the Original Term, or Renewal Term, will expire within six (6) months.

SECTION 5 - SALARY

- 5.1 The District agrees to pay Employee a salary of \$156,000.00 per year, payable in installments and at the same time, and in the same manner, that other District employees are paid and reduced by any payroll taxes and other legally required deductions.
- 5.2 Employee may have his salary reduced at the same time and in the same percentage and/or dollar amounts based upon the same method of computation as any such across the board reductions for other District employees.
- 5.3 Employee shall be considered for an increase in his salary effective July1 of each year commencing in July 2017 based on performance pursuant to Section 11.

SECTION 6 - BENEFITS

- 6.1 RETIREMENT. Employee shall be a member of the District's retirement plan adopted and existing pursuant to contract with the California Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS). Employee will be responsible for paying 8% of his salary towards his employee PERS contribution.
- 6.2 MEDICAL, DENTAL AND VISION BENEFITS. The District shall provide medical, dental and vision insurance coverage in the same manner and with the same coverage as it provides to its other employees.

6.3 LEAVE TIME

- (a) Employee shall accrue, and have credited to his personal account, sick leave, vacation leave, administrative leave and holiday pay on the same basis as other District employees. Employee agrees not to take any vacation or administrative leave at a time that would adversely impact the District.
- (b) Employee shall also be entitled to payment for any accrued but unused sick leave, vacation leave and administrative leave upon termination whether through Board action or resignation.
- 6.4 TERM LIFE INSURANCE. The District shall bear the full cost to provide Employee with term life insurance coverage using the same formula as other full time District employees.
- 6.5 PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT EXPENSES AND DUES. The District shall pay all reasonable and necessary business expenses incurred by Employee in performing services under this Agreement. Such expenses shall include but shall not be limited to telephone, professional dues, subscriptions, conferences, seminars and meetings necessary for the District's continued participation in national, regional, state and local associations and organizations.
- 6.6 TRAVEL EXPENSES. The District shall pay all travel, accommodation and food expenses incurred by Employee for conferences, seminars and meetings associated or related to the District's business or professional training and development. Such reimbursement shall be subject to applicable District regulations and practices.
- 6.7 BONDING. The District shall bear the full cost of any fidelity or other bonds required by law or policy.
- 6.8 DISTRICT VEHICLE. Employee shall have the use of the District vehicle for commuting purposes and for no more than di minimis personal use.
- 6.9 BENEFITS NOT OTHERWISE PROVIDED FOR. Except as otherwise provided herein, the District shall provide Employee with the same package of benefits as other District employees.

<u>SECTION 7 – ACTS ENTITLING EMPLOYEE TO SEVERANCE COMPENSATION</u>

- 7.1 Employee shall be entitled to the severance compensation set forth in Section 8 of this Agreement under the following conditions:
- (a) If the Board terminates Employee, prior to the expiration of the Term or a Renewal Term, pursuant to Section 3.2, for reasons other than those set forth in Section 9.

SECTION 8 SEVERANCE COMPENSATION

- 8.1 In the event that Employee's employment ceases pursuant to Section 7.1(a) of this Agreement, the District shall pay Employee a lump sum cash payment in an amount equal to Employee's monthly salary set forth in Section 5 multiplied by eight (8) or by the number of months left on the unexpired term of the Agreement whichever is less. Employee shall also be entitled to continue his health benefits as set forth in Section 6.2 for eight (8) months or for the number of months left on the unexpired term of this Agreement, whichever is less.
- 8.2 The Parties to this Agreement expressly acknowledge and agree that the severance compensation provision set forth in this Section is not a limitation on the District's discretion to terminate Employee's employment, but rather a means of determining the amount owed to Employee should the District exercise its discretion to do so.
- 8.3 Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the Agreement is terminated, the maximum cash settlement that Employee may receive shall be an amount equal to Employee's monthly salary multiplied by the number of months left on the unexpired term of the Agreement. However, if the unexpired term of the Agreement is greater than 18 months, the maximum cash settlement shall be an amount equal to Employee's monthly salary multiplied by 18.
- 8.4 In addition, if Employee were convicted of a crime involving an abuse of his office or position, Employee would be required to fully reimburse District for any severance benefits provided or any other cash settlement related to his termination, in accordance with Government Code Section 53243.2.

SECTION 9 TERMINATION WITHOUT SEVERANCE RIGHTS

- 9.1 The District may terminate Employee without payment of the severance compensation set forth in Section 8, only under the following circumstances:
 - (a) Employee violates Section 12 of this Agreement.
 - (b) Employee is convicted, pleads guilty, or pleads nolo contendere, to any felony or to a misdemeanor involving dishonesty or moral turpitude.
 - (c) Employee's termination is the result of an act that would constitute bribery, perjury, embezzlement, fraud, or other malfeasance.
 - (d) Any willful breach of this Agreement

- (e) Habitual neglect of duties required to be performed under this Agreement.
- (f) Any acts of dishonesty, fraud, misrepresentation or other acts of moral turpitude.
- (g) Any harassing, threatening, intimidating, or hostile acts towards any employee, board member, member of the public, or employee of other public agency.
- 9.2 During any investigation into any misconduct alleged against Employee, if Employee is provided paid administrative leave and is subsequently convicted of a crime involving an abuse of his or her office or position, Employee shall be required to fully reimburse the District any paid leave salary in accordance with Government Code section 53243, as amended.
- 9.3 Any funds provided for the legal criminal defense of Employee shall be fully reimbursed to the District if Employee were convicted of a crime involving an abuse of his or her office or position, in accordance with Government Code section 53243.1.

SECTION 10 - RESTRICTION ON TERMINATION

10.1 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement to the contrary, the District shall not be obligated hereunder to pay Employee any amount exceeding the amounts specified in Government Code, Sections 53260 et seq., as existing on the date or any renewal date of this Agreement.

SECTION 11 - PERFORMANCE EVALUATION

- 11.1 The Board shall evaluate the performance of Employee not less than once per year and one such evaluation shall occur in May. The criteria used may be added to or deleted as the District may from time to time determine after consultation with Employee. To the extent permitted by law, said review and evaluation shall be private and confidential, and the results shall be summarized and discussed in Closed Session, to the extent permitted by law, or through some other mutually acceptable non-public means. The parties agree that the primary purpose of such evaluations is to facilitate open and frank discussion, define roles and expectations, identify performance strengths and weaknesses, and to provide an opportunity for Employee to take affirmative action to address weaknesses and areas needing improvement.
- 11.2 In recognition of satisfactory performance, a merit increase may be granted to Employee at the time specified in Section 5.3 of this AGREEMENT. In giving effect to the provisions of this Section, the Board and Employee mutually agree to abide by all provisions of applicable law.

SECTION 12 - EXCLUSIVE EMPLOYMENT

12.1 Employee shall devote his full time, energy and efforts to the position of General Manager, and shall accept no outside employment.

SECTION 13 - OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT

- 13.1 The Board, in consultation with Employee, may set forth in writing any such other terms and conditions of employment as they may determine from time to time, provided such terms and conditions are not inconsistent with or in conflict with the provisions of this Agreement, any regulations, rules, policies or procedures of the District, or other applicable law.
- 13.2 DISTRICT agrees that this AGREEMENT shall be binding upon successors and assigns of DISTRICT.
- 13.3 In the event of any legal action between the parties to enforce the provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable legal fees and costs incurred in the prosecution or defense of the action.

SECTION 14 - NOTICES

14.1 Any notices to be given hereunder by either party to the other in writing may be effected either by personal delivery or by mail. Mailed notices shall be addressed as noted below, but each party may change its address by written notice given in accordance with this Section. Notices delivered personally will be deemed communicated as of actual receipt. Mailed notices will be deemed communicated and received as of five (5) calendar days following the date of mailing of the notice.

SECTION 15 - ENTIRE AGREEMENT

15.1 The foregoing contains the entire agreement of the parties and supersedes any and all other agreements, either oral or in writing, between the parties with respect to the employment of Employee by the District and contains all of the covenants and agreements between the parties with respect to that employment. Each party to this Agreement acknowledges that no representations, inducements, promises or agreements, oral or otherwise, have been made by either party, or anyone acting on behalf of either party, which are not embodied herein, and that no other agreement, statement or promise not contained in this Agreement shall be valid or binding on either party. In addition, the inclusion of Employee in any benefits or other rights provided to other District employees shall not result in Employee

being deemed an employee with any status other than as set forth in this Agreement and shall not constitute any right to be considered within an employee organization or with any other similar rights.

SECTION 16 - MODIFICATIONS

16.1 Any modifications to this Agreement shall be effective only if in writing and signed by both parties hereto.

SECTION 17 - EFFECT OF WAIVER

17.1 The failure of either party to insist on strict compliance with any of the terms, covenants, or conditions of this Agreement by the other party shall not be deemed a waiver of that term, covenant, or condition nor shall any waiver or relinquishment of any right or power at any one time or times be deemed a waiver or relinquishment of that right or power for all or any other times.

SECTION 18 - PARTIAL INVALIDITY

18.1 If any provision of this Agreement is for any reason deemed by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional, illegal, invalid, void, or otherwise unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless continue in full force and effect without being impaired or invalidated in any way.

SECTION 19 - GOVERNING LAW

19.1 This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California, in full force and effect as of the date of execution.

SECTION 20 - RIGHT TO LEGAL ADVICE AND REPRESENTATION

20.1 Employee acknowledges and agrees that he has been notified and given the opportunity to seek the advice and legal representation of legal counsel in regard to the development and execution of this Agreement. This Agreement shall not be deemed to have been developed by any particular party as a result, the provisions of this Agreement shall not be interpreted in a manner more favorable to either party.

ELEMENT OF THE DISTRICT'S EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

Staff has drafted for the Board's review an Employee\Family Emergency Plan (Plan) that will be an element of the Emergency Response Plan (ERP). In the event of a declared emergency all District employees become Disaster Service Workers and must report to work. District management understands that this will be a difficult and stressful requirement for employees during an emergency and recognizes the need to address the concerns that are associated with this obligation. The purpose of this Plan is to provide supplies to the employees to help ensure the safety and well-being of their families during emergency situations. This function is an imperative element of the Emergency Response Plan in which it will allow the employee to report to work with assurance that their family is secure.

The Plan identifies supplies that staff recommends to be contained in a Family Emergency Kit supplied by the District. This kit will be issued to the employee and is property of the District which will be returned in the event the employee terminates employment.

As an option to the District putting together these kits I have provided information regarding examples of kits that can be purchased and issued to the employee for your review.

Upon review and feedback from the Board staff will bring this item back for approval at a future meeting that will coincide with the adoption of the ERP.

FISCAL IMPACT

Estimated cost of each kit ranges from \$129 upwards to \$400.

Twentynine Palms Water District Employee/Family Emergency Plan

The Twentynine Palms Water District's Board of Directors recognize the importance of having a plan in place, that will ensure the welfare of all the employees of the District and the welfare of all the employee's direct family members.

The safety and well being of the employees and their families in emergency situations is imperative to the function and operations of the Twentynine Palms Water District.

In disasters, no matter the size or complexity, staff must know that their family is safe and being taken care of in order for the employee to function in his or her duties for the District. Therefore, the Board of Directors has adopted this plan as part of the Emergency Response Plan

All employees of the Twentynine Palms Water District are employees of Local Government; therefore, all employees are under California Law, Disaster Service Workers. All employees must report to work in any disaster. If any employee fails to report to the nearest governmental office, the worker can be terminated

In the event Twentynine Palms Water District, the City of Twentynine Palms, the County of San Bernardino, or the State of California declares an emergency, all public employees are obligated to serve as Disaster Service Workers (DSWs). As DSWs, public employees may be assigned to perform activities which promote the protection of public health and safety or the preservation of lives and property. Disaster Service Worker requirements are designated by Government Code 3100 – 3102 and Labor Codes 3211.92 (b).

- Public employees include all state, county, city and local government employees.
- DSWs provide services and aid during a declared emergency, disaster or catastrophic event.
- At any time during a declared emergency you are required to report to work and you may be assigned to disaster service work.
- As a DSW, you may be assigned to locations and duties outside of your normal job responsibilities.

The government code is recited below:

"3100. It is hereby declared that the protection of the health and safety and preservation of the lives and property of the people of the state from the effects of natural, manmade, or war-caused emergencies which result in conditions of disaster or in extreme peril to life, property, and resources is of paramount state importance requiring the responsible efforts of public and private agencies and individual citizens. In furtherance of the exercise of the police power of the state in protection of its citizens and resources, all public employees are hereby declared to be disaster service workers subject to such disaster service activities as may be assigned to them by their superiors or by law.

3101. For the purpose of this chapter the term "disaster service worker" includes all public employees and all volunteers in any disaster council or emergency organization accredited by the Office of Emergency Services. The term "public employees" includes all persons employed by the state or any county, city, city and county, state agency or public district, excluding aliens legally employed.

- 3102. (a) All disaster service workers shall, before they enter upon the duties of their employment, take and subscribe to the oath or affirmation required by this chapter.
- (b) In the case of intermittent, temporary, emergency or successive employments, then in the discretion of the employing agency, an oath taken and subscribed as required by this chapter shall be effective for the purposes of this chapter for all successive periods of employment which commence within one calendar year from the date of that subscription.
- (c) Notwithstanding subdivision (b), the oath taken and subscribed by a person who is a member of an emergency

organization sanctioned by a state agency or an accredited disaster council, whose members are duly enrolled or registered with the Office of Emergency Services, or any accredited disaster council of any political subdivision, shall be effective for the period the person remains a member with that organization".

Therefore, the Board of Directors hereby declares the following; items will be put in place for all employees of the Twentynine Palms water District.

- All employees shall contact their supervisor in the event of a disaster. All
 employees are to report to the District's main office, if phone contact is not
 available, if the main office is not functional, all employees are to report to
 the Fluoride Removal Plant.
- District staff is to ensure that there are supplies, i.e. Food, water, sanitary facilities, sleeping area's that can support the families of employees for 3 to 7 days.
- If an employee's home is inhabitable or the employee is concerned about the wellbeing of the family, living in his/her home; the employee is instructed to bring the family to the District's Emergency Operations Center (EOC).
- The EOC staff will appoint a shelter manager to help keep families safe and keep order in the shelter.
- Once the City of Twentynine Palms, County of San Bernardino or State of California opens an evacuation Center, all families will be moved to the evacuation center.
- If an emergency happens during normal business hours, employees are to remain at work. The District's Emergency Operations Center will release employees to ensure the safety of the employee's families living in the employee's household.
- All District staff will be supplied with a take home "Family Emergency Kit" which will include the following items.

Water proof matches

Axe
Military Shovel
AM/FM radio

Family emergency kits are to be signed out by each employee, each kit will remain the property of the Twentynine Palms Water District and are to be surrendered to the District upon terminate of employment for whatever reason. The kits are for emergency purposes only. Any items used in non-emergency events will be billed to the employee.

Potable water, a minimum of one gallon per person for day 7 days
Family size tent
Extra clothing (warm)

1. <u>ENGINEERING</u>

A. No items to report.

2. WATER QUALITY

- A. <u>Chlorine Levels</u>: Average levels maintained in the storage and distribution system ranged from a low of 0.11 mg/L to a high of 0.28 mg/L. Chlorination point (the point where chlorine is introduced into the distribution system) averages ranged from 0.19 mg/L to 0.55 mg/L.
- B. <u>Bacteria Samples</u>: A total of 38 routine bacteria samples were collected at test points for the storage and distribution system during this past month. In addition 10 special bacteria samples were collected. All routine and special samples indicated ABSENT for Collect.
- C. <u>Fluoride Samples</u>: A total of 16 fluoride samples were collected at established test points for the storage and distribution system, and 6 fluoride samples were taken from potable water production wells. Fluoride levels in the distribution system ranged from a low of 0.93 mg/L to a high of 2.3 mg/L. Fluoride measurements collected at the wells ranged from a low of 0.39 to a high of 2.0 mg/L.
- D. <u>General Physical</u>: A total of 12 general physical samples were collected from established locations as a part of routine testing requirements. Levels reported for color are <3, 1 for threshold odor and <0.1-0.3 for turbidity.
