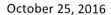

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

On October 20, 2016 the District conducted a table top exercise that provided training to staff on the recently adopted Emergency Response Plan (ERP). The exercise coincided with the "Great California Shake-Out Drill" which simulated a major earthquake on the San Andreas Fault

Sierra West Consultants were on-site to provide support, input and observation on the use of the ERP. The exercise included break-out groups, simulated response to scenarios and group discussions. Sierra West Consultants has prepared an "After Action/Corrective Action Report" for your review and discussion and will give a brief presentation to the Board.

SHAKE OUT 2016 TABLETOP EXERCISE

Thursday, October 20, 2016

After Action/Corrective Action Report

Facilitator: GARY STURDIVAN, Sierra West Consultants, Inc.
Observer/Recorder: JILL TRUDEAU, Sierra West Consultants, Inc.

The Twentynine Palms Water District (TPWD) along with Sierra West Consultants conducted a tabletop exercise of response actions in a simulation of a significant earthquake incident. The exercise was conducted coincident with the State-wide ShakeOut emergency response activities. This After Action/Correction Action report summarizes the activities at TPWD and identifies areas for improvement.

Introduction to Exercise

- Discussion of the likelihood of a major earthquake on the southern section of the San Andreas Fault and the impacts to the TPWD.
- Discussion of the new TPWD Family Emergency Plan and the importance of each family having an emergency plan and supplies.
- USGS 7.8 earthquake video presentation.
- Drop and cover exercise at 10:20AM.
- Discussion on when and how to declare a State of Emergency.
- Discussion on the locations of the TPWD Emergency Operations Centers

Incident Scenario

- A disastrous 7.8 earthquake has hit the southern section of the San Andreas fault, with intense shaking felt from the Salton Sea to Lancaster.
- The TPWD has been severely compromised, including reports of the collapse of the Donnell Reservoir, possible chemical spill at the treatment plant, pipeline failure at Adobe and Buena Vista, Desert Heights tank buckled, and dead bodies along Twentynine Palms Highway below Donnell Reservoir.
- There is no landline phone or cellular phone service, and no electricity.
- Highway 62 is impassable, since the fault crosses the highway.

Exercise Highlights

The EOC was formed in the Board Room of the TPWD. The section Chiefs of Operations, Planning, Logistics, Safety, Finance, and Public Information were appointed. White boards were set-up. The TPWD Emergency Response Plan was consulted and utilized.

The TPWD staff conducted mock surveys of the damage to District's facilities and operation. The Facilitator added the drivers and "field" comments throughout the exercise. Damage reports were received from the field. Participants were directed on which EOC Sections were responsible for handling various tasks and functions. Participants were encouraged to adhere strictly to the established chain of command to ensure orderly communications.

Discussion ensued as to how to communicate with the employees and their families, the City of Twentynine Palms, County of San Bernardino Office of Emergency Services, Emergency Response Network of the Inland Empire (ERNIE), California Water/Wastewater Agency Response Network (CalWARN) and other agencies and authorities. The new satellite phone was utilized and there was a discussion on how to access the local HAM radio operators to provide a link to the outside world. There was a discussion about the TPWD two-way radio system and the repeater on Donnell Reservoir. If the repeater is not working, then the two-way radios in the vehicles can change frequency and talk vehicle to vehicle, which would allow radio communications in the immediate area.

There was a discussion about operational solutions that could be immediately put into place, if staff were already in the field. Staff could assess pipeline and tank failures, on their way back to the EOC. Staff could turn off gate values to isolate tank and save water in the system.

A generator was dispatched to Well 17.

A "Do Not Use Water Order" was issued by the EOC Director, due to there being no water in the system. The decision was made to send untreated water into the system for fire suppression and the water would not be potable, because of the spilled chemicals and broken chemical feeds at the treatment plant. The State Department of Water Resources was notified, and the "order" was conveyed to the County OES, and to the media through the Public Information Officer. A discussion then followed on what it takes to lift a "Do Not Use Order."

List of Needed Resources from Outside of the District

- Structural Engineer, for buildings and reservoirs
- Hazmat Team
- Fuel
- Laboratory Services
- Mutual Aid from CalWARN. Items requested from CalWARN are listed below.

- Staff
- Repair crews
- Water and Food
- Pipeline repair parts as well as pipe
- Portable water reservoirs
- Haz-Mat clean-up crew

Financial issues were a concern. The Board of Directors were kept apprised of expenditures. Discussion of what could be done to ensure adequate mutual aid response if cash reserves were depleted. The Finance Chief informed the EOC Director that the TPWD had depleted all monies available to the District. The EOC Director contacted the District's Board of Directors for authorization to open a line of credit with the bank, and authorization was granted by the Board of Directors. The need for detailed documentation, including timesheets, receipts, requisitions, and the like (for FEMA reimbursement) was emphasized.

Conclusion of Exercise

Each participant was asked what they learned. Comments:

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"There's a lot to learn".
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Each participant was asked what could have been done better. Comments:

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"We don't have the supplies we need."
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[&]quot;Everyone needs to keep to his/her own responsibility."

[&]quot;Everyone needs to chip in."

[&]quot;We have to remember the big picture."

[&]quot;I learned a lot. This made it more real."

[&]quot;it's really important to follow procedure."

[&]quot;I have a better understanding of the magnitude of it."

[&]quot;I understand communications better."

[&]quot;Knowing the area is a big benefit."

[&]quot;Everyone is important."

[&]quot;We weren't familiar with using satellite phone."

[&]quot;Uncertain about field crew reporting-in procedure."

[&]quot;Need ongoing training."

[&]quot;Easier access to information in ERP."

[&]quot;The better the communications, the less chaos."

[&]quot;Using the forms."

[&]quot;More Delegation."

[&]quot;Make use of all resources."

ACTION ITEMS

- Ensure that each employee has a Family Emergency Plan.
- All employees to be trained in the use of communication devices including vehiclemounted two-way radios and the satellite phone.
- All employees to be trained in use of appropriate forms necessary for FEMA reimbursement.
- Fully stock storage room with food, water and supplies for employees and families (consider needs of mutual aid respondents).
- Create and distribute consolidated version of Emergency Action Plan ("cheat sheet") with procedures, phone numbers, reminders, etc., for use by individual employees.
- Use Target Solutions (or other free software) to give basic ERP test, print certificates, and gather signatures of all staff who received training.
- Set-up emergency line of credit at the bank.
- Store copies of all keys (including vehicles, mobile equipment, offices, etc.) in a lock box near EOC location.
- Report to TPWD Board of Directors on exercise, action plan, and budgetary needs.
- Do another tabletop exercise (in 3-6 months) with Chief roles (including EOC Director) assigned to different people.
- Compile emergency response agreements and approved list of vendors.
- Acquire additional Government Emergency Telecommunications Service (GETS) cards for staff.
- Set up communications with the HAM Radio Club in Twentynine Palms area.
- Coordinate with the San Bernardino County Office of Emergency Services on the redundant communications system that is utilized by the County in an emergency.
- Have emergency credit cards available.
- Put a diesel fuel plan into place, ensuring adequate reserves.
- Purchase inexpensive laptop computers for each Section Chief and install the ERP and needed forms pertinent for each section in the EOC.
- Provide additional staff training on how to use the ERP.
- Ability to transfer phones from main office to Treatment Plant to be explored.

Supplies needed in the TPWD emergency storage facility. Items that were discussed are:

- Food
- Water
- Flashlights
- EOC Vests
- Cots, Blankets
- Personal aids such as toothbrushes and toothpaste, toilet paper, soap, sunscreen, etc.
- First Aid supplies

INJECTS FOR GOLDEN GUARDIAN 2016 Twentynine Palms Water District

- 1. Twentynine Palms Water District, report they are conducting windshield surveys and are without power, phones and SCADA systems.
- 2. Ask the question of what happened during the EQ to the main office?
- 3. The City of Twentynine Palms reports that there are massive storage tank and pipeline failures.
- 4. Twentynine Palms Water District reports: there are homes destroyed on the south side of Twentynine Palms Highway due to the water storage tank Donnell Reservoir suddenly releasing all contents and washing homes away, this water has also washed out the highway. There are bodies on the other side of the highway. Communications towers on site are not useable including the District's repeater.
- 5. Fire sprinklers have ruptured in the building water.
- 6. Twentynine Palms Water District, is requesting locations of staging areas from County of San Bernardino OES, to direct the public to receive bottled water.
- 7. TPWD is requesting communication with State DWR Water Division.
- 8. Marine Base has contacted the TPWD to report: the off-base housing has no water.
- 9. TPWD has activated CalWARN and is requesting mutual aid.
- 10. TPWD is requesting routes from County OES to get mutual aid from Northern California.
- 11. Treatment Plant appears intact, but some of the chemical feed lines have been split apart. The chemicals in the containment rooms have leaked and the secondary containment are full. There are long cracks in the ground that disappear under the waste units and appear on the other end that run off, out into the desert.
- 12. Communications with County OES.
- 13. People coming to the EOC wanting to know where to get water.
- 14. Power lines and poles on highway are down.

On July 26, 2006, the Board of Directors passed Ordinance 90 setting the compensation for members of the Board and establishing an expense and use of public resources policy. This ordinance established that members of the Board shall receive \$100 for each attended Board meeting, not to exceed (10) meetings per month, as well as "for each day's service rendered by a Director by request of the Board." The ordinance further states that payment for services would be rendered as long as a formal request was made and the Board provides prior approval of payment of a daily meeting stipend.

Water Code section 20202 authorizes an increase in the compensation that may be received by the Board up to an amount equal to five percent (5%) for each calendar year since the effective date of the last increase.

Upon Director Giannini's request at the October 26, 2016 Board meeting, the following is a comparison of other District's daily stipends.

1. Consideration to Adopt Resolution 16-18 Wastewater Master Plan

Mr. Lynn Takaichi gave a presentation on the regulatory framework and planning process of the Wastewater Master Plan. The main objectives of the study were to estimate existing and future wastewater flows; develop hydraulic model of the trunk sewer system to identify future facilities that could be needed if the area was to be taken off the existing septic systems; and prepare conceptual level planning costs for the wastewater system identified. The District and City entered into a joint collaboration on the plan to protect the groundwater quality and potential groundwater impacts from septic tanks within their boundaries and sphere of influence.

Staff recommends adopting Resolution 16-18 thereby placing the District and City in a more favorable positon to identify potential implementation and funding strategies; update the requirements for onsite wastewater disposal; obtain grant funding; data collection; and sets a plan of action in place.

At the September Board meeting, Mr. Butler addressed the Board and asked for consideration to have a remote meter installed near the northeast property corner. 3. Consideration to Approve California Employer's Retirement Benefit Trust (CERBT) Funding In fiscal year 2014/2015 the Board recognized the need to set aside funds for the postemployment health benefits provided to employees upon retirement through age 65. Subsequently, \$120,000 was set aside during that fiscal year, \$94,573 in fiscal year 2015/2016, and \$96,571 in fiscal year 2016/2017. Future allocations will be brought to the Board during the annual budget process. Staff recommends the Board approve the transfer of the allocations in the amount of \$311,144 to the CERBT Trust Fund.

Water quality levels were normal for the month. Water production was down 1% as compared to the same month in 2013.

Ms. Byerrum reported the Audit was completed in October. Due to scheduling conflicts, the final audit will be presented to the Board in January. Water sales look favorable. The transition to Pacific Western Bank has been completed.

6.3 General Manager

Mr. Kolisz spoke with the Regional Water Quality Control Board and pressed upon them that the District is looking for approval to move forward with filling Pond 3 while it is still under warranty. The District participated in the Great Shake Out opening up the Emergency Response Plan (ERP) and conducting a table top exercise.

1. <u>ENGINEERING</u>

A. No items to report.

2. WATER QUALITY

- A. <u>Chlorine Levels</u>: Average levels maintained in the storage and distribution system ranged from a low of 0.06 mg/L to a high of 0.24 mg/L. Chlorination point (the point where chlorine is introduced into the distribution system) averages ranged from 0.22 mg/L to 0.50 mg/L.
- B. <u>Bacteria Samples</u>: A total of 48 routine bacteria samples were collected at test points for the storage and distribution system during this past month. In addition 7 special bacteria samples were collected. All routine and special samples indicated ABSENT for Collect.
- C. <u>Fluoride Samples</u>: A total of 16 fluoride samples were collected at established test points for the storage and distribution system, and 8 fluoride samples were taken from potable water production wells. Fluoride levels in the distribution system ranged from a low of 0.74 mg/L to a high of 2.4 mg/L. Fluoride measurements collected at the wells ranged from a low of 0.33 to a high of 2.3 mg/L.
- D. <u>General Physical</u>: A total of 13 general physical samples were collected from established locations as a part of routine testing requirements. Levels reported for color are <3, 1 for threshold odor and <0.1 0.3 for turbidity.
